As we are all getting ready to join the 1st World Scout Education Congress, we are pleased to provide you with this additional practical information. (Read more about Hong Kong on page 15 of Bulletin n°2)

AIRPORT RECEPTION

Taking into account the flight routings and schedules coming from different parts of the world, the Host Committee's Airport Reception Team will welcome participants at the Hong Kong International Airport on both 20 and 21 November.

A Reception Desk will be set up in the area immediately before the Immigration inside the restricted area, while a further Reception Counter will be set up at the Arrival Hall.

Upon your arrival at the Hong Kong International Airport, you will be greeted by Hong Kong Scouts in full uniform before the immigration counters. They will direct you to the immigration counters and provide assistance at the Baggage Reclaim Area if needed. You will be greeted again by our Scouts at Arrival Hall A & B after going through the Customs, followed by transfer to B P International House

Airport transfer will only be available to BPIH.

Please ensure that you submit your itineraries at the online registration system or to inform the Host Committee by email at wsec@scout. org.hk, and do not forget to wear your Scout Uniform or at least your Scout Scarf on arrival for easy identification.

COMMONLY FOUND PROHIBITED / CONTROLLED ITEMS

The commonly found prohibited / controlled items are dangerous drugs, psychotropic substances, controlled chemicals, antibiotics, arms, ammunition, fireworks, strategic commodities, rough diamonds, animals, plants, endangered species, telecommunication equipment, game, meat, poultry and powdered formula.

Passengers are liable to prosecution if these items are brought into / out of HKSAR without a valid licence or permit. These items will also be seized and confiscated.

Intercultural awareness

Welcome to a unique cultural adventure at the 1st World Scout Education Congress. This Congress will give you a unique opportunity to experience Intercultural exchanges and understandings among young people from many different NSO's, countries and cultures.

You can be sure that during the following week you will encounter a truly wonderful global environment with participants from each of the six Scouting Regions and many different cultures. It is essential to approach the congress with an open mind and respect for other cultures.

Each culture shapes its perceptions and behaviours by paying attention to some details of reality and ignoring others, by permitting some actions and forbidding others. The way each culture shapes, however, is felt to be natural by the people concerned; and while some aspects of other cultures can sometimes feel comfortable or desirable, many others can be perceived unnatural.

As you commence the week consider these intercultural awareness suggestions to assist you during this week in Asia.

- Think about the use of your left hand e.g. shaking hands and using the left hand is not acceptable to some cultures and religions. Be observant.
- Gift giving is extremely important in Asia. Bring small gifts from home to reciprocate. Always give and receive gifts with two hands. Do not open the gift in front of the person, do that in privacy.
- Respect a person's personal space; do not stand too close if you do not know them well. Remember your body language when meeting or working with your elders. Do not cross your arms or legs or stand over them. Work at their level.

- Eye contact is very important.
- Respect peoples cultural or religious beliefs when it comes to the consumption of alcohol.
- If you find it difficult to use chopsticks it is acceptable to ask for a knife and fork or fork and spoon.
- Inclusiveness is very important is all sessions, some people will be shy, frightened to use English etc. so finds ways to include them..... translate if possible.
- Avoid touching or hugging with strangers especially in games and activities as you do not wish to embarrass anyone.
- Respect cultural requirements when entering temples, mosques, churches etc.
- Respect male/female cultural requirements such as behavior in public.
- Remember your dress code....think about what you wear to sessions, shoes, blouses for women should have a sleeve etc.
- Ensure you bring enough name cards. Name card giving and receiving is very important, give and receive with two hands with the words facing the person you are giving it too.
- Finally some sessions are live streams take care when delivering or participating and remember all cultural sensitivities.

Welcome again to this once-in-a-lifetime intercultural experience at the 1st World Scout Education Congress.

NSO/NSA Participation at the Congress

From the very beginning, the Congress has set out to be an event willing to involve as much as possible of its main audience, the National Scout Associations. From the composition of its various teams to the information-sharing services on the website and social media, the event tried to make sure that all views and backgrounds are taken into account when building its programme and structures.

However, what we hope to achieve at the Congress goes beyond merely taking into account the NSAs' opinions and concerns – we hope to have national leaders from all over the World ACTIVELY contributing to the programme of the event.

So, what's in for an association and how can YOU be involved?

1. ENSURE THE SESSIONS PREPARED ARE REALLY ANSWERING YOUR EXPECTATIONS

Encourage every leader at national level in your association interested in education to familiarize her/himself with the topics which will be addressed at the Congress and comment on each session page with her/his views, aspects that she/he would like to see addressed, etc. Our facilitators are closely monitoring their pages and are more than willing to engage in a dialogue, as well as adapt the session so that it answers the real expectations of all the public, the ones present in Hong-Kong but, mainly, those following the event online.

2. PROPOSE AN NSO/NSA-LED SESSION/ INTERESTING PRACTICE AT THE CONGRESS

Without any doubt, there are many Associations that have done some great work and set important milestones in the areas pertinent to Scout education. We would like to see these inspiring practices promoted to all participants at the WSEC! Therefore, the Planning Team is proposing three types of NSA-led input and sharing opportunities:

- Innovative projects, new ideas and approaches, successful programmes – if you have a presentation of some work done by your NSO/NSA that can be explained in max. 15 minutes, then the Town Fair (Friday, 22 November, from 21:00 to 22:30) is the best place to share. Request a slot by filling this application form before the 15th of November! (See from online: http://www. worldscouteducationcongress.org/en/nso-ledsessions)
- Useful resources, books, magazines, project materials – if you would like to share the educational resources of your NSO/NSA and promote future events and initiatives, then the Market on Saturday, 23 November, from 18:30 to 19:30 is the best time and place to share.

- An area of work related to education in which your association has made significant progress, using new approaches and with **verified results** – we have three slots available for full-fledged (90 minutes) sessions during the Congress for NSAs willing to present new topics and work with other national leaders on certain topics. By signing up for this opportunity, your NSO/NSA is committing to ensure the content and the format of a workshop which meets the requirements of a World event. You will receive the same support as any other facilitator and the session will become part of the official programme of the Congress. 3. PROMOTE AND HELP ORGANISE A WSEC@YOURNSA/NSO

As you are certainly aware, following an event online is useful and entertaining, but even much more so if it is done together with friends and people with a common interest. To encourage this, the World Scout Education Congress is calling every NSA interested to organise a "WSEC@YourNSA" session, for national leaders interested in the topics related to education.

"WSEC@YourNSA/NSO": What do I need to do to host it?

Even though we would want every NSO to be represented on site in Hong Kong during the Congress, we realize that not all NSOs will be able to send participants. However, we still aim at having all voices of our Movement represented, and that is why we invite you to organize a WSEC event in your NSO and participate virtually!

The idea is simple: a group of people from your NSO working on Education in Scouting gathers in one place and follows sessions virtually through our webpage and social media, and discusses the session topic. Afterwards, you provide us with your input on the topic, and we include it in the final report of the Congress! Through this, we are trying to enable as many as possible NSO/NSAs to have their voice heard in the Congress Discussions, even if you do not have representatives on site in Hong Kong.

YOU LIKE THE IDEA? HERE'S HOW YOU PROCEED:

Each "WSEC@Your NSA" will be an independently held event of WSEC.

- Create an NSO profile here. We kindly ask you to use your full NSO/ NSA name and emblem as profile picture. (see form online: http://www. worldscouteducationcongress.org/en/ register)
- 2. The procedure for registration is the same as for individual participants, therefore we would kindly ask you to inform us about the creation of your profile by sending us an email at congress@scout.org with the name of your NSA/NSO and profile name no later than November 15th. In the email, please also indicate the name and email address of the person in charge for the event.
- 3. And your profile is then created!
- 4. 4Next, identify the members of your team, who will be present during the event and contribute to creating a NSO/NSA report for the Congress afterwards.
- Take a look and decide about the sessions/ topics you want to discuss in your NSA/O. Read what the session is about and also the proposed questions.
- 6. Find a place suitable for holding the meeting. If the meeting is going to be held virtually, find the best channel for you to do so. Test to see if everything is working (sound, video, etc).
- Appoint a moderator to lead the discussions, as well as rapporteur who will document the key discussion points and conclusions.



YOU MAY:

- A) Meet some days or hours before the session is going to be held in Hong-Kong (In this case, you are invited to send us the conclusions of your discussions before the session in Hong-Kong starts, so that they can be given to the facilitators for consideration of before the session starts.
- B) Meet during the session (In this case: follow the live streaming of the session (if available) and the discussions that are happening on the website's session page. React with your comments to the facilitators' questions and give your group's inputs and questions as well.
- C) Meet after the session has been held (In this case: Watch the recording of the session (if available) and discuss the session's outcomes stated on the session page. Use this as an input for your discussions

INDEPENDENTLY OF WHEN YOU ARE GOING TO HOST YOUR EVENT, KEEP IN MIND SOME GENERAL REMARKS:

- Take a moment for a round of introductions before you start the discussions within your group.
- 2. Appoint a rapporteur and moderator (if not done before the meeting).
- 3. Present the objectives and what the session is going to be about.
- 4. Present the context/inputs (or follow the session if it is simultaneously).
- Develop the group discussions/questions (if the session is simultaneous, consider whether to ask them to the facilitators directly in the comment section of the session page or to answer them on your own).
- 6. Write a final report. Include a list with full names of the persons who attended your event.
- Take pictures of the event. Besides a group picture (if possible) take also some reflecting the debates and work moments during the session.
- Send us an email with your the report. Include the pictures you have taken. If you have recorded your event, share the link where you uploaded the recording (youtube, webpage, etc.).
- Your NSO/NSA will receive a certificate for participation in the WSEC by email, a couple of weeks after the event.
- For promoting your event (especially in social media), please use the title WSEC@(your NSO/ NSA name).
- 11. You are invited to use the logo of the WSEC in your promotional pieces. Note: The logos cannot be modified.

Last, but not least, don't forget to follow up within your NSO about your discussions! The World Scout Education Congress aims at being a milestone event for Education in World Scouting – however, to achieve this, we need to ensure a high-quality follow up on its results within each of our NSOs.
